


What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

- Introduced via the Localism Act 2011, Neighbourhood Planning is a right for local people to have a greater say in shaping the places they live and work in
- NPs enable communities to have more influence and control over their local area to help ensure they get the right type, design and location of development in their area
- NPs' statutory status gives Neighbourhood Plans far more clout than other local planning documents, such as a parish plan
- We have an opportunity to shape Wootton's future development and growth

- Meeting affordable housing need
- Housing for the elderly
- Conversion of redundant buildings
- Code for Sustainable homes
- Car parking spaces

Community/Social

- Protection of local shops & pub
- Protection of village hall and sports hall
- Allotments
- Bus links
- Fast Broadband
- Development of community hubs

Environmental

- Dark Skies protection
- Access to Local Green Spaces
- Enhancement of biodiversity
- Place specific design policies
- Green energy policies

Economy



- Encouragement of working from home
- Creation of business uses in village
- Development of workshops
- Creating skills and training opportunities
- Visitor attraction measures

What NP's can not do

- Must comply with:
- National Legislation (Planning & Other)
- National & Local Planning Policy



Developing the NP is a three-stage process

- 1 Getting established: creating the survey, mapping responses
- 2 Preparing the Plan: ensuring it aligns with wider planning legislation
- 3 Bringing the Plan into force: examination and referendum
